1959	Invercarron took over & cattle grazed in winter too – which churned up the soil.
1940 -80	Clay pigeon shooting in the wood, every 2 nd Sat – stopped in 80s when the residents of newly built Oakwood Place complained. The hut was used by the Clay pigeon shooters
1971	Oak, larch, scots pine & spruce felled for firewood. Thought to include the large larch, spruce & Scots pine around the curling pond Birch & willow grow in place of felled trees. (bracken too?)
	History of Gearrchoille as Community Wood
1988	Group set up by Community Council to lease area of woodland from Balnagown estates on a 20 year lease Path marked out, bridges & stiles constructed. Aims & objectives written draft management plan Problems with area of lease Lease lapsed.
	Outline Planning permission granted to Balnagown estates for houses in the field between Oakwood Place & the woodland
2001/2	Community council again express an interest in leasing the wood. Discussions with Balnagown result in the wood being gifted to the community. Larger area. (13.48 ha, 33.3 acres) Open day in the wood, organized in conjunction with North Highland Forest Trust (NHFT). Public opinion canvassed for doing things in the wood & people invited to register an interest in being involved in further developments regarding the wood.
Spring 2003	Meetings held in the hall for interested parties. Decision taken to form a steering committee (open to anyone who wanted to be there) to take forward the process of forming a company limited by guarantee to take ownership of the woodland from Balnagown. The company to be called 'Gearrchoille Community Wood, Ardgay' Bird ringing organized in the wood. Pupils from Gledfield School involved.

Feb 2004	Narrower path continued to dead pine tree. Certificate of incorporation of public company limited by guarantee - Gearrchoille Community Wood Ardgay
March 2004	Picnic benches & kissing gates provided by Highland Access Project. Also finger posts & waymarkers
May 2004	Moth night. Bird ringing continues
4 th June 2004	First meeting of 3 directors. Robin Ross, chairman, Hilda Buchanan, Betty Wright.
Sept 2004	Plans approved for 4-car car park. Grant available through NHFT. Paths for all meetings & training
Dec 2004	Work on Car park
